




# Learning, Iterating and Adapting for Change



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## GDI on Learning, Iterating and Adapting for Change

### What

In complex scenarios, the ones commonly faced by development work, interventions will continuously encounter unexpected difficulties during implementation. Hence practitioners and key stakeholders should be better equipped to face uncertainties common to development processes. Projects need to develop systematic strategies to learn, course correct and adapt when intervening in dynamic local contexts.

### Why

Given the non-linear and interactive relationships that characterize development programs, it is not sufficient - nor effective - for a specific program to learn practical lessons by relying solely on retrospective analysis and evaluation of past experiences. Experiential learning and learning by doing should work simultaneously to better inform decision making throughout the intervention process for bringing about meaningful and sustainable change.

### Who

Practitioners and key stakeholders should use a more effective mix of tools to improve their learning on how to navigate effectively in such complex environment. A delivery-focused approach needs to incorporate adaptive management tools to continuously signal the road and the implementation process that finally leads to close the delivery gap.

### How

Identify those key factors and enabling conditions affecting implementation processes and understand how to address those delivery challenges as to apply the change pathways - and course corrections – towards more effective policies. And connect those change agents behind these change processes.
